### The President's Pen by Kit Whitehill

June is here and it is time to shake off the Covid-19 lethargy and "Get Out the Vote" for the November Presidential election. I hope you read NFRW President Ann Schockett's article in the NFRW newsletter regarding the thousands of calls made by NFRW volunteers to help ensure victories for newly elected Congressmen **Mike Garcia** (CA-25) and **Tom Tiffany** (WI-7). According to President Schockett, "Our NFRWarriors across the nation stepped up and made the difference in these races. In addition to the efforts of the California and Wisconsin Federations that were already actively engaged in the elections in their states, the NFRW put out a nationwide call to



action with a goal of generating an additional 10,000 phone calls over a 10-day period. In true NFRW fashion, members crushed that goal with almost twice that number (18,931) calls!" What a great example of strength in numbers!

Texas must elect our Republican candidates and we need YOUR help to accomplish that. Simply voting isn't enough to win in 2020. It is vital that TFRW members register new Republican voters, get Republican voters out to vote, and train voters to vote in every race from the White House down to the Court House.

TFRW recently hosted a conference call featuring Steve Munisteri, Senator John Cornyn, Karl Rove, and TFRW President Glynis Chester and they shared several reasons why the 2020 is so critical.

- After the census is complete, it is anticipated that Texas will have 2-3 more members in Congress which translates into 2-3 more electoral votes.
- Redistricting will happen next Session in Austin.
- If Democrats take only 9 seats in the State House, it will flip.
- Losing one State Senate seat would give the Democrats the ability to block any bill.
- The party that is in control in the House and Senate will dictate how district lines are drawn, which will affect elections for the next ten years.

Previously David worked for twelve years at Hillsdale College, where as Founding Director of the Washington, D.C.-based Kirby Center for Constitutional Studies and Citizenship he created an online Constitution course accessed by millions of Americans. Author of *Humility: An Unlikely Biography of America's Greatest* 

Virtue (HarperCollins, 2013), and a chapter on Frederick Douglass in a recent volume (Oxford University Press, 2019), David has written for the Wall Street Journal and Fast Company, and is currently writing a book on the future of civics. He earned a Ph.D. in political science from Boston College. David and his wife Anna live in northern Virginia with their two sons, Walker and Michael.

# Memorial Day Reflections

As we just observed Memorial Day a week ago, the question of how much do we know about Memorial Day was raised. Here are excerpts from a recent My Faith Votes article.

- Memorial Day began as a response to the carnage of the Civil War. After the Civil War ended in the spring of 1865, Americans began holding springtime tributes by reciting prayers and decorating with flowers the graves of countless fallen soldiers. It was a way to remember those who had given, as Abraham Lincoln beautifully <u>said</u>, "the last full measure of devotion" to defend their nation.
- On May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic issued an order to set aside a unique day for Americans to place flowers on the graves of war heroes, and on May 30 of that same year, the first <u>Decoration Day</u> was held at Arlington Cemetery. President Ulysses S. Grant presided over the first ceremony. Some <u>5,000 people</u> attended, and James A. Garfield a Civil War general, a Republican congressman from Ohio and future president spoke. Following his nearly two-hour speech, schoolchildren from a local orphanage led war veterans, many who were still scarred from battle, to place flowers on all the gravesites of the soldiers, both Union and Confederate, as a sign of unity.
- After World War I, Memorial Day was amended to include all men and women from our armed forces who gave their lives serving our nation. The name "Memorial Day," which was first used in 1882, became more common than "Decoration Day" after World War II, but was not declared the official name by federal law until 1967. In 1971, Memorial Day became officially a federal holiday.
